

Chieftains Win Epic Battle at New Lex' Rockwell Stadium

NEW LEXINGTON - What a great night of football we witnessed tonight. We saw tonight a great football game with lots of hard hits and two great running games. The game went right down to the wire, but when it came down to it, the Chieftains picked up their 20th straight victory 13-12.

The Chieftains struck first, after a drive in which Harden saw several carries, and Penrod completed a 24-yard pass to Chaz Kline to get the ball inside the 5. Junior Dicken caught a beautiful 6-yard TD pass from Penrod. The ensuing PAT was no good because of a bad snap. For the rest of the first quarter, both teams pushed back and forth. Both teams turned the ball over, as the Panthers lost a fumble and Penrod was intercepted.

New Lexington would strike back in the second quarter. After receiving a Logan punt on their own 29 yard line, the Panthers Drew Cannon burst up the sideline and took the ball all the way to the end-zone. The Chieftains would block the PAT, keeping the scoring even at 6. Both teams would continue to struggle offensively, and the score would still be 6s after the first half of play.

The second half started with a bang. Early in the 3rd quarter, the Panther's Drew Cannon ripped off a 71-yard TD scramble, putting the Panthers on top 12-6. New Lex's 2-point conversion try would fail. Logan wasn't done either though, as Harden returned the favor by going 60 yards on Logan's next possession, and Adam Puhl would add the extra point, and putting the Chiefs on top for good 13-12.

The Chieftains' Jason Dicken would block a punt on the Panthers next possession, but the Chiefs were unable to capitalize. Things would continue to go back and forth, until 8:21 to go in the game. New Lex took over on their own 27 yard line. New Lexington would go to Cannon on 11 straight plays, and found themselves on a 3rd and goal from the 9 yard line. Panthers QB Tyler Huffman rolled out, and was hit by linebacker Derek Harden, and subsequently fumbled the football. DB Jeremy Coakley recovered, and took off down the sideline. The ball slipped out of his hand on the 20 yard line, but luckily it bounced out of bounce. The Chiefs would get to within the 5 yard line, before a Harden fumble would give the ball back to the Panthers.

The Panthers had the ball with one minute remaining, but the Chieftain would put on the clamps. New Lexington got off one big play, an option pass from Cannon to Coleman McCoy for 37 yards. Time would then run out on the Panthers.

The Panthers's Drew Cannon ran for 169 yards on 24 carries, while Logan's Derek Harden ran for 150 yards on 21 carries. Penrod was 7-14 for 48 yards and threw one interception. New Lexington fumbled the ball 7 times, losing four, while the Chieftains fumbled 4 times, losing 3.

The player of the game for week one is Junior Jason Dicken. Dicken caught the lone TD pass, recovered 2 fumbles, sacked the quarterback twice, and blocked a punt. He was all over the field.

The Chieftains weren't perfect on the field, but their record is still 1-0. The Chieftains will start a 3 game home stand Friday when Nelsonville comes calling on Friday at 7:30. The Buckeyes are led by QB Jason Meade, and defeated the Athens Bulldogs 22-7 on Friday night.

Logan Continues Winning Ways in 50-6 Drubbing of Nelsonville

LOGAN - The Chieftains played an under matched Nelsonville football squad on Friday. The Buckeyes came out and fumbled on their first two offensive plays, setting the tone for the night. 14 fumbles later, 9 of those by the Buckeyes, Logan was 2-0 after a 50-6 drubbing of Nelsonville.

Logan managed just a field goal after the Nelsonville fumble. On the next Logan possession Matt Mong rumbled 34-yards for the first TD of the night. But another fumble was the result of the next Buckeye series, and the Chieftains put the ball in the end zone on this one. Alex Penrod hooked up with Chaz Kline for a 24 yard TD pass, making the score 10-0. On the next offensive possession for the Bucks, another fumble was the result, and Chad Kratzenburg returned it 13-yards for another Logan TD. The PAT was blocked, but Logan led 23-0 after a quarter of football. In the second quarter, Harden was the main man, as he scored from 2 and 5 yards out while also adding to his rushing total. Logan built a 36-0 halftime lead.

Logan continued their domination in the third, as Derek Harden ripped off a 52-yard run for a TD. The PAT was added on by Puhl. Logan found gold once more on Jeremy Coakley's 52-yard punt return for a TD. Logan led 50-0, and finally Nelsonville scored on the Logan 3rd team on Chase Elliott's 39-yard run.

Logan's defense held the Buckeyes to 205 yards, but half of those came against the 2nd or third teams. Logan fumbled 5 times, losing two, both by Derek Harden, and Nelsonville fumble 9 times losing 6.

Player of the game for week 2 is a tie, Matt Mong and Chad Kratzenburg. Both players had HUGE nights on defense, with Kratzenburg returning a fumble for 6. Matt Mong had the TD from fullback and had several HUGE blocks to spring Harden.

Friday night looms large, as Division Two rival Zanesville (1-1) comes calling.

Logan Dominates Trenches in 13-0 Shut-Out of Zanesville

John Scott, a WVU signee, was held to 3 yards on 4 carries, and went out of the game in the second quarter after re-aggravating an arm injury.

Player of the game goes to Matt Mong again this week. He tormented QB Gunner Mohler all night, and had two big TDs. The win extended Logan's regular season winning streak to 22 games. Logan begins SEOAL play on Friday as the Raiders of River Valley come calling. River Valley is 0-3.

Chiefs Win in a Shut-Out for Second Straight Week, Win First SEOAL Game 54-00

LOGAN - Coming into Friday's football game, there were a lot of emotions stemming around not only the city, the state, but the entire nation. Luckily for some of us, Friday night's football game provided an escape from the horrors of this week's tragedy.

Anyone who knew anything about this week's football game knew it would not be much of a game. The Chieftains came in having won 22 straight games, while the Raiders came in having lost 34 straight. By the time the night was over, you could add one more to each of those streaks.

The Chieftains dominated the first quarter, holding River Valley to almost no positive yardage and allowing only one first down. Logan scored 20 points in the first quarter. Harden scored the first two TDs of the night, from 13 and 5 yards out respectively. The third score was from Matt Mong. Mong bulled his way in from 3-yards out with only 2 seconds left in the first quarter.

The second quarter did not get any better for the Raiders. It took the Chiefs 4 minutes to score in the second quarter, when Derek Harden once again found pay dirt from 3-yards out. It took just 2 minutes for the Chiefs to strike again, this time Alex Penrod found Chad Kratzenburg for a 26-yard TD. The last score of the first half was a beautiful run by Harden from 13 yards out, Harden broke over 5 tackles on his way to the score.

In the second half the Chieftain starters played only 1 series, capped off by a power run from Matt Mong 11-yards out. The Final score came in the fourth quarter when Sophomore Austin "Hardcore" Rohr scored the first TD of his Varsity career from 13-yards out.

The stats for the game were impressive. Logan tallied 22 1st downs and 370 total yards of offense. Derek Harden carried the ball 22 times for 151 yards and scored 4 touchdowns. Matt Mong carried the ball 6 times for 33 yards and 2 TDs. Alex Penrod was 5-7 for 106 yards and one TD pass, including a career long completion, a 46-yard catch by Jason Dicken, and a career long TD pass, the 26 yard grab by Kratzenburg.

Logan did not punt the ball a single time in the football contest.

Player of the game for week 4 is Quarterback Alex Penrod, who had one of his sharpest games of the season. Penrod appears to be coming into his own under center. Logan returns to action Friday when it visits the Warriors of Warren. Kick-Off is slated for 7:30.

The second half was more Logan, Mong scored on a one yard run and Coakley scored on a 3-yard run. Point Pleasant scored early in the fourth after a muffed punt by the Chiefs gave them the ball on the 18 yard line. Also in the fourth sophomore "Hardcore" Austin Rohr scored for the third straight week, scoring from 38 yards out. Out of time-outs, Logan was unable to recover the onside kick. They took over with just 12 seconds remaining. On first down Penrod fired to Kratzenburg to attempt a spot pass, but the ball sailed out of bounds. On second down the Rocks snuck two players into the backfield, and sacked Penrod, ending the game.

Logan fought to the last second, but turnovers were a killer.

Logan gained 277 yards in the game to Dublin's 151 yards. Alex Penrod was 14-28 for 198 yards and a TD with 2 interceptions. Brady Quinn of Dublin was 6-17 for 90 yards and a TD.

Matt Mong caught 5 passes for 86 yards, and threw for 64. Jeremy Coakley caught 5 passes for 94 yards. Three Logan turnovers were their downfall.
